Dear Parents, carers and pupils,

Please drop us an email or phone into the school office and your messages will be passed on so that they can be dealt with. As I said last week, our focus at the moment is to have happy children in school and we will do everything we can to make sure that every pupil is coming into school happy and ready for the day ahead.

the bin, as well as providing a good habitat for animals.


Homes for amphibians

In many places there are not enough natural places for toads, frogs and amphibians to hibernate over the winter months. We built a safe space for them.




Minibeast Safari
